C.I.G.O CONSIDERS HERITAGE CENTRES REPORT

The highly critical Value for Money Report on the Irish Genealogical Project (Heritage Centres) was discussed by the Council of Irish Genealogical Organisations at its July meeting in Dublin. The Comptroller & Auditor General's report is now set to be examined in detail by the Public Accounts Committee of the Oireachtas (Parliament), though, C.I.G.O.'s meeting heard calls for the radical overhaul of the Irish Genealogical Project and its incorporation into the Public Library Service under the control of Local Authorities. This would, it is claimed. ensure that proper mechanisms are in place to monitor its development as an asset for the Nation. Dun Laoghaire Genealogical Society sought that the same sanctions would apply to the structure of the Irish Genealogical Project and Irish Genealogy Limited as would pertain in the commercial world should such a report be delivered by a company's auditor. The C. & A.G.'s Report clearly calls for change and, following the spending of nearly IRP15 million on the I.G.P., the people of Ireland, as owners of this genealogical heritage, demand and deserve value for money from the Irish Genealogical Project. Radical change is the only hope for a viable and secure future for the Heritage Centres and their dedicated staff. Local Authority management of these centres, under the direction of the County Librarians, will fulfil the main object of the I.G.P., vocational training and a service for family historians in each county area. IRISH SURNAMES ARE "BRITISH"

Jeff Chapman of the website Family Chronicle has produced a listing of surnames from Great Britain and Ireland on the internet showing their origins and meaning. However, all the Irish surnames, yes our "O's" and "Mac's" are described as being of "British" origin. Mr. Chapman, in a reply to an e-mail from Jim Ryan, maintains that "the main reason is convenience, since many so-called Irish names actually come from Great Britain" and that "almost all Irish names in use today have been heavily Anglicised, and thus not truly native Irish". Jim Ryan challenged this position and to our amazement, he received the following statement in reply, "most Irish names have hardly anything in common with their original forms. A name such as "Kelly", for example, isn't Irish, it's simply a British name which was imposed atop an Irish name that started with a K sound and ended with a Y sound. Sadly, this is the case with the vast majority of Irish names". Incredible as the existence of such outlandish and erroneous views may seem, it is sad to see genealogy and history so distorted in what purports to be an "information" page. Clearly, Mr. Chapman would have benefited by a period researching Irish history and availing himself of the many fine publications on the market covering the topic of "Irish Surnames".
