WHAT'S THE FUTURE FOR C.I.G.O. ?

Following the failure to achieve a quorum at the November 28th Annual General Meeting of the Council of Irish Genealogical Organisations, is it time to review of the role and function of the organisation? The organisation's constitution may need radical overhaul to embrace the actual rather than the aspirational position of Irish genealogical organisations. The non-commercial organisations require a vibrant networking arrangement to ensure that the voice of their members is heard at national level as it is clear that the views of this sector are not always in tune with the requirements of those with a commercial interest in genealogy. Accessibility, and in particular, free and open accessibility, to genealogical records is the concern of our members. This Society will continue to represent the views of our Members on the various issues of concern to genealogists at national level and to offer an alternative "non-commercial" genealogical view. This was never more clearly the case when the Society tackled the much confused issue of the proposed charges at the GRO as highlighted in the November 1998 issue of "The Genie Gazette". Our view, not supported by commercial genealogists, is straightforward, no nonsense, microfilm copies of all Birth, Marriage and Death records over seventy years to be made available, free of charge, in the National Library and the National Archives leaving the GRO with its core function "registration & certification". This follows the practise adopted in most western democracies - why not Ireland? A newly vamped CIGO may be able to advance this view, whereas, the present CIGO could not - CIGO must change to reflect the views of the vast majority of Irish genealogists or be wound up and the sooner the better.

(ISBN 1 898471 01 0) This is a very useful heads of household and visitors finding aid to the village of Baldoyle in North County Dublin for the 1901 Census.

"Irish Genealogical Sources No. 11 - Harold (Boys) School, Glasthule, County Dublin - Registers 1904 - 1948" compiled by Eithne Guilfoyle. Price IRP9.00 plus IRP1.00 p+p Ireland & UK: IRP2.00 elsewhere. (ISBN 1898471 06 1). These school registers are very useful to the genealogist and social historian covering the periods before, between and after both World Wars and a period of high emigration from Ireland. Though, this is just the boys school, it can assist in the completion of whole families, siblings, fathers' occupations etc.
