LOCAL GOVERNMENT RECORDS

This year is the centenary of the most important local government reforms undertaken in Ireland when the hated, discredited and landlord dominated Grand Juries were replaced by elected County Councils under the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898. This Act and the earlier Registration (Ireland) Act, 1898, extended the franchise to women and gave them the right to sit on district councils and act as town commissioners, though, not to sit on county or borough councils. Kingstown had its own Town Commissioners from 1834 under an Act 'for the paving, watching, lighting, regulating and otherwise improving the town of Kingstown'. The eighteen Town Commissioners were elected by the ratepayers of Kingstown and were empowered to oversee much of the development of the town and to appoint constables, watchmen and beadles. The constables were instructed to preserve the peace and were authorised to detain 'all felons, malefactors, disturbers of public peace, disorderly persons, rogues, vagrants, beggars and all other such persons found misbehaving'. Elevated to the status of an Urban District Council under local government reforms, Kingstown's administration finally passed into Nationalist (i.e. majority) control just before the First World War. This heralded an end to the Town's shameful neglect of its poor as documented in 1844 by Dr. Haliday. In 1911 some 500 of its houses were vacant due to high rents and this, more than anything, exemplified the attitude of the pre-nationalist Council to the majority of the Town's inhabitants, descendants of those who built the town, the pier and the railways. Access to the County Council's archive would greatly enhance research. Would not the publishing of a guide to such records be a fitting commemoration of the 1898 Act?.

BRITISH PUBLIC RECORD OFFICE

The Director of Public Services of the British Public Record Office, Dr. Elizabeth Hallam Smith, has advised that the First World War Soldiers' Documents, Burnt Series (WO 363) are being filmed and will be transferred to public access as each alphabetical letter is completed. Filming, funded by the British National Lottery, began for men whose surname began with N,O,Q,U,V, and Z. The P.R.O. has placed a bid for further funding from the UK Lottery to complete the filming by 2002. A total of 33,000 boxes of records are to be filmed and Society members are requested by Dr. Hallam Smith to write to the British Public Records Office, Kew, Richmond, Surrey, TW9 4DU, England supporting this bid and this important project which will greatly assist genealogists and historians throughout these islands.
