EGO PATRICIUS

"Ego Patricius peccator rusticissimus et mininmus omnium fidelium comtemptibilissimus apud plurimos patrem habui Calpornium diaconum filium quendan Potiti presbyteri " ("Patrick, in his own words" by Joseph Duffy, Dublin 1972 -ISBN 0 901810 89 4). Thus begins the "Confessio" of St. Patrick, whose feast day, March 17th, is celebrated by the Irish throughout the world. Time to think of home and friends and family overseas. In Patrick's own words we have him affirming his genealogy, possibly, all too aware of the importance his Irish hosts paid to such matters. "I am Patrick, a sinner, the most unlearned of men, the lowliest of all the faithful, utterly worthless in the eyes of many. My father was Calpornius who was a deacon and a son of the priest Potitus" Indeed, to the early Irish he was "Mac Calprainn" (son of Calpurnius) the man who confronted High King Laoghaire mac Niall Noigialaigh on the Hill of Slane in 432 AD. This Laoghaire was the founder of the fortress from which our town derives its present name of Dun Laoghaire and the great grand uncle of Columcille (Columba) who brought Christianity to Scotland. Whilst, celebrations to mark the foundation of Dun Laoghaire are being held throughout the year (info: tel. 205 4818 or fax 230 1656), as genealogists, St. Patrick's Day has a special significance for our Diaspora and the contribution to Irish genealogical research made by people like the late Dr. Eduardo Coghlan of Argentina. Dr. Coghlan, who died last August Buenos Aires, researched the Irish contribution to Argentina for over fifty years culminating in his excellent publication "Los Irlandeses in La Argentina" which gives the genealogical background to over 4,000 families of Irish origin who emigrated to Argentina. A

copy is available in the National Library of Ireland and the Society's Archive. An appreciation of the life of Dr. Coghlan was published in The Irish Times on Monday March 2nd. 1998 by "J.R.". "His work will ensure that the Latin-American component of the Irish diaspora is recorded for posterity" (J.R.) It is the memory of "Mac Calprainn" that unites all Irish people, including those 500,000 or so in Argentina, once each year, in the celebration of St. Patrick's Day. On behalf of our Society's President, O Conor Don, the Executive Committee wishes all members, their families and friends a very happy St. Patrick's Day.

LOSS OF MANUSCRIPT REGRETTED

As reported in "The Genie Gazette" in January 1998, the following appeared in The Irish Times of Friday February 20th 1998.

The Minister for Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht & the Islands expressed regret yesterday that it was not possible for the National Library to buy the Nugent Manuscript at Sothebys last December because of lack of resources. Ms. de Valera said that the manuscript was sold for 140,000 sterling. Allowing for auctioneer fees, currency conversion and other costs, an outlay of about 180,000 (UKP?) would have been involved. She said the library's agent at the auction was authorised to incur a total expenditure of 150,000 (UKP?) to acquire the manuscript. A substantial supplemental grant was earmarked by the Department for this purpose. While she regretted it was not possible to acquire the manuscript, she believed the approach adopted was the correct one, having regard to all the circumstances. (I.T. 20/2/98)

The Council of Irish Genealogical Organisations - CIGO, will meet on Monday March 9th in Dublin and hopefully, resolve the matter of this Society's resolutions deferred at the November 1997 A.G.M. of CIGO for consideration by the constituent member organisations and the DLGS proposals for Standing Orders, deferred at the January meeting for consideration by the constituent member organisations. The text of the proposals for Standing Orders was despatched by An Cathaoirleach, Rory Stanley, to each constituent member organisation on December 4th 1997. Whilst, Raheny Heritage Society has advised DLGS that it does not support the proposals, the North of Ireland FHS has indicated its support for the proposed Standing Orders aimed at structuring the business of CIGO in order to facilitate the fullest consideration of any proposals brought before CIGO.
