### WELCOME TO A NEW YEAR OF GENEALOGY ON "DUBLIN'S RIVIERA"

The final year of this millennium is set to be an exciting period for the Society. Starting the works at the Martello Tower is foremost in the minds of the members of the Executive Committee and hopefully, by February all the pieces of the jigsaw will be in place and work can finally commence to restore and refurbish this historic building as a permanent base for the Society's growing Archive. This year also sees the Society's Morning Meetings return to The Port View Hotel, Marine Road, Dun Laoghaire and a full programme of lectures and workshops for the Evening Meetings in Comhaltas in Monkstown. Links with the North of Ireland FHS, the Anglo-Irish FHS (Liverpool) and possibly, T.I.A.R.A. in Boston, USA., will be strengthened during the year to provide more research opportunities for our Members. The Archive will re-open on Monday 11th January and our Archivist, Frieda Carroll, will be on hand to assist Members with their research queries. However, Frieda has requested that copies of each Member's Birth Brief be lodged with the Archive to facilitate cross referencing. The detailed planning and computerisation of the Archive for transfer to the Martello Tower has been placed in the very capable hands of Dr. Eithne Guilfoyle and George H. O'Reilly MA. The Society intends to develop a state-of-the-art facility at the Martello Tower for genealogical research and education. facility, An Daonchartlann, will the first of its kind in the Republic and will, no doubt, become a major attraction for visitors to Ireland tracing their "Irish roots". Indeed, our computerisation programme (and other services) would be greatly advanced by the acquisition of a multi-media Pentium Computer should a kind sponsor be

found to donate one to the Society. The Deansgrange Cemetery Project may well enter its final phase this year with each of the pre-1950 sections transcribed and ready for publication. The Society's range of publications will continue to expand during the year with many more titles in the "Irish Genealogical Sources Series" planned or in production. Orders for the eleven already published in this series are being received from all quarters of the globe. For the information of our Overseas Members and readers, Ireland was one of the eleven European Union countries to join the Euro Currency on January 1st and non cash transactions have commenced in the Euro. Cash transactions will be possible by 2002. Each of the Society's publications will be priced in Euros and Punes. The rate of the Punt is now fixed at EURO1.27 (.787564 conversion rate), therefore, the following rates now apply: Membership Fee EURO12.70 (IRP10.00): Four issues of the Journal EURO22.32 (IRP16.00) for UK & Ireland and EURO25.40 (IRP20.00) for others. Cheques in Euros are available in most banks, however, Sterling, Australian, Canadian, American and New Zealand Dollar cheques will also be accepted by the Society at the equivalent rate to the EURO. With the adoption of the Development Plan for the County of Dun Laoghaire Rathdown and the inclusion of the following in the written statement: 4.4.7. It is an objective of the Council to provide an art gallery, a local museum and a theatre. (page 71) is it possible that the County Town of Dun Laoghaire may join its counterparts around Ireland by having its own museum?. If so, this will bring to a close nearly twenty years of campaigning by local historians and the Dun Laoghaire Borough Historical Society. The Historical Society set up a Local Museum Trust to receive items for inclusion in the museum. An Foram Oidhreachta (The Heritage Forum) included the provision of a local museum in its Jan. 1997 publication "Towards a County Heritage Policy" and in its submission on the Draft Development Plan. With this commitment now in place, should we not make the provision of a Local Museum a countywide Millennium Project. Artefacts are being collected by the Museum Trust now.
