FIVE YEARS A GROWING?

This year as Dublin's Riviera will be swinging between the two great annual festivals of Ireland's "official" American Independence Day celebration and Bastille Day & "The Taste of France", the little known and possibly, unmarked fifth anniversary of the foundation of the Council of Irish Genealogical Organisations will fall on July 9th 1999. Yes, just five short years ago in the regal splendour of the Royal Marine Hotel in Dun Laoghaire C.I.G.O. was born with the adoption of its constitution by four of the six organisations present at the inaugural meeting. Hopes were high to develop an organisation worthy of becoming a truly national representative body for genealogists. However, its birth was far from smooth and the meeting was a tense and difficult exchange of very differing views on the role of family history societies and the Heritage Centres. Differences ran deep and, in many cases, remain so to this day hampering the development of an Irish equivalent of the Federation of Family History Societies in the United Kingdom. Many observers thought that CIGO's birth was a number of years premature and, in retrospect, there is possibly some truth in this view. However, five years on, with the benefit of hindsight and a greater public awareness of genealogy in Ireland, thanks to publications like "Irish Roots" magazine, does wiser counsel on the way forward exist? It's hard to know. Have those with a commercial interest in the subject, including Irish Genealogy Limited and the Heritage Centres, come to understand the voluntary sector or, indeed, vice versa? Possibly not, though with just four months to go to CIGO's fifth birthday, should all concerned with Irish genealogy not reflect on the past five years, the set backs, the developments, the endless reports and studies and now, earnestly consider the way forward? If CIGO is past its "sell by date", as some may think, it never achieved its goal of representing ALL Irish genealogical organisations and those it did represent, rarely permitted it to function as envisaged on July 9th 1994. Is it time to start again ???

Wednesday 17th February 1999 in answer to a Parliamentary Question in Dail Eireann, Mr. Seamus Brennan, T.D., Minister for State, indicated that "Heads of a Bill" to modernise the General Register Office in Dublin will be published in late 1999. The Society welcomes this new opportunity to examine the functions of An tArd Chlaraitheoir (Registrar General) and the General Register Office and to seek greater accessibility to the microfilm records of pre-1928 Births, Marriages and Deaths through the National Library and the National Archives.
