THE YEAR OF THE €URO

With the introduction of Euro notes and coins on January 1st 2002 and the phasing out of the Punt by February 9th 2002, a new era in European history is born. The Euro will now be the official currency in Finland, Germany, Austria, Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, France, Ireland, Spain, Portugal, Italy and Greece. Many of the smaller European states like the Vatican, Monaco, Andorra, San Marino and parts of the former Yugoslavia have also adopted the Euro. The United Kingdom, Denmark and Sweden are not. for the moment, adopting the Euro, though, it will be readily available through banks in those countries. The Society had already adopted the Euro for in-house accounting in advance of the changeover. The following Euro rates were agreed by the Board for the Society's publications, membership etc.

Membership Fees

For Overseas Members familiar with the US\$, at the time of writing, the current exchange rate of the Euro to the US\$ is circa .90 US cents, which, should make understanding the value of the Euro quite easy.. In accordance with Board Res. 01/09/86 from the 1st of January 2002 the annual Membership Fee for both Irish based and Overseas Members is €15.00 payable via the Website or directly to the Membership Officer who will issue a laminated Membership Card as receipt of payment.

1901 CENSUS The Public Records Office of England and Wales has placed the 1901 Census for England and Wales on the Internet for public access. The Society warmly

welcomes this move by the PRO as a progressive step toward greater public accessibility to genealogical records. The Website http://www.census.pro.gov.uk will be up and running from January 2nd 2002, however, demand is expected to be very great indeed and some difficulty of access may be experienced. This development should be noted by the authorities in Ireland as a fine example of what can be achieved if there is both the direction and will to do so.

JEWISH CEMETERY Following the transcription of the memorial inscriptions in the Jewish Cemetery in Dolphin's Barn, Dublin by members some time ago, it was decided to withhold the printing of this volume until the Hebrew elements of each memorial was also transcribed. Vice-President of the Society, Mr. Stuart Rosenblatt, PC, conducted a further survey of the cemetery working on the earlier transcriptions prepared by members and he had the Hebrew names transcribed alongside the assumed names of each individual. Mr. Cecil Calmonson of the Jewish Burial Society checked, where possible, the details of both the English and Hebrew inscriptions against the burial register to ensure the accuracy of each source of information. Mr. Rapheal Siev of the Jewish Museum in Dublin is currently writing an essay on the Jews of Dublin to be included in the publication and the new Chief Rabbi, Rev. Yaakov Pearlman, will be providing the foreword. The editor of the Irish Genealogical Sources series, George H. O'Reilly, will soon decide on the format for publication i.e. A4 or our normal A5 size book. Further information next month.

CONFERENCE The XXVth International Congress of Genealogical and Heraldic Sciences will take place in Dublin from 16th to 21st September 2002. The Congress is being organised by the Office of the Chief Herald under the direction of the Chief Herald of Ireland, Mr. Brendan O'Donoghue, and with the support of the Minister for Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht and the Islands, Ms. Sile de Valera, TD. The Congress sessions will be held in Dublin Castle and there will be a programme of other events in Dublin and in Kilkenny. The theme of the Congress will be Genealogy and Heraldry: their Place and Practice in Changing Times. This is intended to encompass historical as well as modern practice. Topics might include genealogy and heraldry in the age of information technology, heraldry in republics like Ireland, Italy, France, USA and South Africa etc., women and heraldry - including female transmission of names and Arms and the use of cadency marks, accessibility of heraldic and genealogical records, heraldry and corporate symbols or "logos". If, in addition to attending the Congress, persons wishing to present a paper on the above theme at the Congress may attach a summary of the proposed paper with their application form. All proposals for Congress papers will be reviewed by a Committee to ascertain their relevance to the theme of the Congress etc. prior to their

YOUR JANUARY REVIEWS

"Éigse Oirialla 1994 – Lámhscríbhinn Staire an Bhionadaigh" by Réamon Ó Muirí. ISBN 0 9522773 0 1, Monaghan, Ireland. This annual from 1994 came to light through the efforts of our Society's best known "book ferret" George O'Reilly who found it in one of the many book sales he attends regularly unearthing items of great value and interest to the genealogist. This volume centres on the life and times of Art Bennett or Art Mac (1793-1879) of Ballykeel, Bionaid Forkhill, Co. Armagh. The committee of commemorated Éigse Oirialla centenary of his death in 1979 and from the events surrounding commemoration the various details of the life and work of this remarkable individual were collated in this volume published in 1994. A poet, writer, historian and political activist who left us circa 14 manuscripts and a large collection of correspondence and miscellany. This volume, written in Irish, is primarily devoted to the collection of histories compiled by Art Mac Bionaid for his patrons. The families of two of his patrons, Fr. Patrick Lamb and Edward Augustus Maginnis receive considerable genealogical attention in this volume with tables etc. The histories cover various periods of Irish History centred on the province of Ulster and the collapse of the Gaelic order in that part of Ireland. There are early tracts dealing with the invasions

of the Vikings, Cambro-Normans, Edward Bruce etc., however, the 16th and 17th centuries seem to have interested him most. Some translations are provided as appendices. The Irish used in the text, though, in the Roman rather than the Gaelic script, is faithful to the south-east Ulster dialect for which a glossary has been included. An example of the different sound of this dialect, now lost, is in the word for college - "calaiste" modern Irish "coláiste" or the older "ceann-sturaidhear" for the modern Irish "ceannaire" or leader. It is not surprising that Art Mac Bionaid would inherit this love for the Irish language, poetry and song considering that works of the great poets Séamus Dall Mac Cuarta, Cathal Buí Mac Giolla Ghunna, Pádraig Mac a Líondáin. Art Mac Cumhaigh and local man Peadar Ó Doirnín were all well known by his people. Far from the image of a lowly depressed peasantry do we find the people of this area, Seán, Art's father was a very well read man who knew Ó Doirnín. However, this volume is also of considerable use to genealogists or to those with ancestors from the south Armagh, north Louth and south Down areas. Besides being of great interest to those of the surname Bennett or the Mullaghbawn McBennett from Forkhill & Creggan areas of south Armagh or indeed, to those descended from the McCanns of Mullaghbawn, this publication has a wealth of local and family history. In appendix no. 1 the writer has compiled details of the baptisms in Forkhill Parish from 1845 to 1880 for Bennett, McConville, Murray, Kelly, McCann, O'Neill. O'Hanlon, McParland, Hamill, Gracey, Casidy, McKinley, McAleavev. McGlade. McCoy, Doran, McCronnin, Campbell, Murphy, Burns, Kerans, Byrne, Daly Grimes, Hughes and related families. Marriages in the same parish from 1845 to 1950; baptisms in Loughgall 1825 to 1880 and baptisms from Creggan Upper for Lamb and related families from 1797 to 1923. This volume ends with an excellent bibliography.

OVERDUE MEMBERSHIP FEES

The Membership Officer, Annette McDonnell, advises Members based in Ireland that the annual Membership Fee fell due on November 1st last year, however, it will run for the calendar year thereafter. Annette has written to Members who were in arrears and she expressed great satisfaction with the response to the reminders.
