Uachtarán Tofa: President Elect



As we were just going to press last month, the results of the presidential election were delivered to the Board on Thursday 7th December 2023. The results were confirmed by Res: 23/12/1787.

The GSI Board declared Vice -President Francis O'Donnell, FGSI, to be the 'President Elect' who will succeed President Stuart

Rosenblatt, PC, FGSI, on 12th March 2024.

Mr. O'Donnell will serve four years of the eightyear term and then, in accordance with the above resolution, he will be succeeded by Vice-President, Fiona Fitzsimons, MA, FGSI, as GSI President.

Amb. (ret.) Francis M. O'Donnell, GCMM, GCEG, KC*SG, KM, KCHS, KCMCO, BA (Hons), FGSI, is a former diplomat and the author of the magisterial and comprehensive work 'The O'Donnells of Tyrconnell - A Hidden Legacy' (ISBN: 978-1-68053- 474-0 published by Academica Press).

Mr. O'Donnell retired from the United Nations after thirty-two years in 2009, having most recently held the following positions: UN Resident Coordinator & 2009) and the UN Resident Coordinator & UNDP Resident Representative in F.R. Yugoslavia (Serbia & Montenegro) (2000-2004). He was Ambassador Extraordinary & Plenipotentiary of the SMOM to the Slovak Republic (2009-2013).

He is a life member of the Institute of International and European Affairs, Dublin, and a member of the Military History Society of Ireland; the Co. Donegal Historical Society, the Kerry Archaeological and Historical Society, and the O'Donnell Clan Association and served as its delegate to Clans of Ireland and briefly as Chancellor of its Order of Merit.

He is a Director/Trustee of the School of Civic Education under the auspices of the Council of Europe; member/moderator of the Global Baku Forum hosted by the Nizami Ganjavi International Centre, and has been an expert/participant in the InterAction Council; a listed advisor to the Global Partnerships Forum (New York); occasional advisor to the Non-Violent Peace Force (an NGO consortium); and a participant in recent discussions on improving UN response to the Russian-Ukrainian war under the auspices of the Foundation for Global Governance and Sustainability (Brussels).

Mr. O'Donnell is armigerous having received a grant of arms from the Chief Herald of Ireland in 2009.



GDPR & GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

The Icelandic Data Protection Authority rejected a complaint of a data subject who demanded the enforcement of the data subject's right to erasure against a controller's genealogical database.

The DPA decided the controller's processing was justified pursuant to Article 6(1)(f) GDPR and that it was within its rights to refuse the erasure request pursuant to Article 17(3) GDPR




Saint Brigid—Naomh Bríd

Since last year Ireland has an annual public holiday in early February to mark St Brigid's Day. The public holiday is the first Monday in February, except where St Brigid's Day (1st February) happens to fall on a Friday, in which case Friday 1st February will be a public holiday, so this year 2024, the public holiday for St. Brigid's Day will fall on Monday February 5th 2024.



February 1st is a special date in the Irish ecclesiastic calendar as it is the feast day of Saint Brigid, the other patron saint of Ireland along with Saint Patrick. St. Brigid has been described as one of the "most remarkable women in Irish history" although, she has always been very elusive according to **Noel Kissane** in his excellent study of Brigid published in June 2017. Although sometimes said to have assumed many of attributes of the goddess Brigid, she was a real person that inspired a cult and was venerated throughout Ireland and overseas. Kissane's 'Saint Brigid of Kildare – Life, Legend and Cult' (ISBN: 978-1-84682-632-0: P/bk: 360pp: Price €24.95) explores the place of this saint in Irish life down through the centuries

Now a **new book published this month** by Four Courts Press examines other aspects of the life of Ireland's female patron saint. *'The Two Lives of Saint Brigid'* (ISBN: 978-1-801151-116-2: P/bk: 192pp: Price €19.95: Web-Price €17.95) by **Philip Freeman** explores the place of this saint in Irish life down through the centuries



St Brigid is the earliest and best-known of the female saints of Ireland. In the generation after St Patrick, she established a monastery for men and women at Kildare which became one of the most powerful and influential centres of the Church in early Ireland. The stories of Brigid's life and deeds survive in several early sources, but the most important are two Latin Lives written a century or more after her death. The first was composed by a churchman named Cogitosus and tells of her many miracles of healing and helping the poor. The second source, known as the *Vita Prima*, continues the tradition with more tales of marvellous deeds and journeys throughout the island. Both Latin sources are a treasure house of information not just about the legends of Brigid but also about daily life, the role of women, and the spread of Christianity in Ireland.

This book for the first time presents together an English translation of both the *Life of Brigid* by Cogitosus and the *Vita Prima*, along with the Latin text of both, carefully edited from the best medieval manuscripts. With an Introduction by Professor Freeman, this book makes these fascinating stories of St Brigid accessible to general readers, students and scholars.

Philip Freeman received his PhD in Classics and Celtic Languages from Harvard University in 1994. He has written extensively on Christianity in early medieval Ireland, as well as the Roman world in late antiquity. He currently serves as Fletcher Jones Professor of Humanities at Pepperdine University in California. (Text from FCP website)

WHAT HAPPENS TO YOUR RESEARCH FILES?

As genealogists and local historians we have, as many of our spouses, partners or immediate family would say, an almost obsessive need to collect books, papers and other material related to our research.

These books, papers, files, photographs and voice or other recordings are essential for our ongoing research. We regularly consult them, cross-referencing information or updating our computer databases of births, marriages, deaths and biographies of our ancestors and related families. We've spent countless long hours over many years, possibly decades, amassing, collating and sorting this information.

These items are, in many respects, our hugely valued research companions—inanimate certainly, but they speak to us, confirming or determining our research pathways. Our daily reliance upon these resources has been evident to those around us, whether, they have an interest or not in genealogy or local history.

But, for a moment let's ponder the question— what happens to all of these cherished possessions when we eventually pass on? Is there someone in the family going to carry on the research with the same passion and dedication that you have shown over the years or is this material destines for landfill or incineration?

Genealogical organisations the world over promote the preservation of such records for future generations of researchers. Many, like this Society, offer a caring place of refuge for such records in their archives.

This facility may be well understood by many family historians, but sadly without each of us making a specific provision for the deposit of our records with an archive, many of these valuable research documents and precious family photographs could end up as landfill or recycled paper.

TRACING YOUR IRISH ANCESTORS

PRÉCIS OF THE DECEMBER LECTURE

The Monthly Lecture via Zoom on Tuesday 12th December 2023 was delivered by Gerard White, MGSI, Director of the GSI Open Meeting & Lecture Programme on the subject 'Patrick Shortt and the Sinking of the ILV SS Isloda in 1940'. The presentation focused on the Naval and Maritime service of his uncle Patrick Short / Shortt (1896-1940). Gerard divided his service in three sections WW1 Royal Navy (1916-1919) (Battle of Jutland 1916). His service from 1919 to 1921 with the **Royal Fleet Auxiliary**. The main focus was on his service with the **Commissioners of Irish Lights** (1927-1940) and the aftermath of the events of 19th December



On the 19th December 1940 the *ILV SS Isolda* was tasked with the transfer of the Christmas Relief Crews for the *Barrels* and *Coningbeg* Lightships off the Saltee Islands. The *SS Isolda* was bombed and sunk by a German aircraft. Six members of the crew of the SS Isolda were killed, one of them was Patrick Shortt. The other twentythree crew members of the SS Isolda and the seven Lightship men survived and made it ashore. The seven men were injured and required medical treatment.

Gerard displayed examples of documents from various agencies involved in the aftermath - An Garda Síochána, RNLI, Commissioners of Irish Lights, Irish Government and the Dept. of External Affairs, The Irish Army G2 Branch (Military Intelligence) and the Coast Watching Service. Gerard covered the area of Censorship in Ireland and how the event was reported at the time and after WWII in 1945.

He explored the documents regarding the pension and compensation received by the widows and their children. Gerard explained that this is an ongoing project with the focus of the research on the role of the British Government in this tragic event.
